#### The context

Way back in 1945, Gandhiji, in memory of his wife Kasturba, established Kasturba Gandhi National Memorial Trust with an aim of welfare of rural women and children.

This Institute is a part of this trust thus works for the same aim.

#### The Practice:-

This practice is being followed since 1963.

- ➤ This practice has resulted in 92% to 95% admission of schedule Tribe rural girls from interior regions of Madhya Pradesh.
- > This Institute serves as a platform for these rural girls to prepare themselves for various competitive examinations
- > Students also avail scholarship from Madhya Pradesh Government.

#### **Evidence of success**

- ➤ Every year at time of admission the number of forms is far more than the number of seats available hence it is a popular college among rural community for seeking higher education.
- Many of our elite alumni are posted at higher and prestigious post in ministry, administration and higher education department of Madhya Pradesh Government.
- ➤ The graduates and post graduates girls from this college are capable of leading a good respectable life. They develop the calibre of working in difficult situations also.

#### Problems Encountered and Resources Required.

- As the girls admitted belong to rural community, they don't have the sound base for acquiring higher education. The faculty has to work hard to improve the basics of languages and other subjects to do better at their UG level. It becomes a tough job to bring these rural girls at par with their urban counterparts. These rural girls are educated trained and polished to face their further life with great efforts and pains taken by the faculty and staff of the college.
- ➤ The college is completely dependent upon UGC autonomous grants for financial resources. Therefore the UGC should release autonomous grant to such colleges as early as possible because without financial resources it becomes difficult to run a college.

#### **Best practice II**

Title of practice

Khadi wearing is compulsory:-It is compulsory for students, faculty and staff to wear Khadi.

#### **Objectives of the practice**

- To inculcate Gandhian ideology
- > To indirectly promote small scale rural artisans based on Khadi and its raw material for livelihood.
- To inculcate the feeling of simple and dignified living among rural girls
- > To inculcate patriotism
- > To contribute to national development.

#### The Context

In keeping with the same patriotic and Gandhian spirit, Khadi, synonymous with freedom struggle and empowerment of women is worn on all the days in Kasturbagram Rural Institute.

- > Since our college is residential, therefore, not only in the classes but our girl students use Khadi throughout their stay in the college as well as in hostel and thus keep the pride & spirit of Khadi vibrant.
- > The national fabric and pride of India, Khadi serves as a great equalizer, enthusesthe students with the essence of our rich, vibrant cultural heritage and inculcates patriotism.
- Above all, this wearing of Khadi, while creating a feeling of belonging, a spirit of oneness, nurturing everlasting bonds subtly manifests and promotes secularism and social equity.

#### The Practice

- > Right from the day of admission students wear Khadi and thereafter, use of Khadi becomes part & parcel of their day to day life.
- In the classes and in other college activities student wear Khadi.
- > On special occasions like Independence Day etc. students put on white Khadi uniform.
- ➤ In our college all the students & staff spin Amber Charkhas at given timings or as per convenience of availability of time.
- > In order to honour the guests during special occasions & functions 'Sut Mala' (Garland of Khadi fibre) is used instead of flower garland as a symbol of Gandhian Ideology.

#### **Evidence of Success**

- > Our girl student's hail from remote rural areas and it takes no time for them to adopt Khadi whole heartedly, as their humble rural background itself is full of simplicity.
- > Sooner than later girl students also get convinced with the importance & social implications of use of Khadi. AsKhadi isrural based small scale industry and is concerned at large for the development of the nation.

#### Problems Encountered and resources required

- ➤ Khadi being less in demand than other kinds of cloth materials is costly .It becomes difficult for our students to afford expensive dress material due to their poor financial condition.
- > The maintenance of Khadi is also difficult as it is purely spun out of cotton without mixture of any other yarn. Hence it loses it color and shape soon. For this it has to be starched after every wash, which is again a costly affair.
